The Rosary - Part 1

The month of October is dedicated to the Holy Rosary. According to an account by fifteenth-century Dominican, Alan de la Roch, Mary appeared to St Dominic in 1206 after he had been praying and doing severe penances because of his lack of success in combating the Albigensian heresy.

Mary praised him for his valiant flight against the heretics and then gave him the Rosary as a mighty weapon, explained its uses and efficacy, and told him to preach it to others.

"Since the prayers of the Rosary come from such excellent sources - from Our Lord Himself, from inspired Scripture and from the Church - it is not surprising that the Rosary is so dear to our Blessed Mother and so powerful with heaven.

If we consider the power of the Rosary as seen in its effects, we find a great abundance of proofs of its wonderful value.

Many are the favours granted to private individuals through its devout recitation: there are few devoted users of the Rosary who cannot testify to experiencing its power in their own lives.

If we turn to history, we see many great triumphs of the Rosary;.

Early tradition attributes the defeat of the Albigensians at the Battle of Muret in 1213 to the Rosary.

But even those who do not accept this tradition will admit that St Pius V attributed the great defeat of the Turkish fleet on the first Sunday of October, 1571, to the fact that at the same time the Rosary confraternities at Rome and elsewhere were holding their processions.

Accordingly, he ordered a commemoration of the Rosary to be made on that day. Two years later, Gregory XIII allowed the celebration of a feast of the Rosary in churches having an altar dedicated to the Rosary.

In 1671, Clement X extended the feast to all Spain.

A second great victory over the Turks, who once, like the Russians, threatened the ruin of Christian civilization, occurred on August 5, 1716, when Prince Eugene defeated them at Peterwardein in Hungary.

Thereupon Clement XI extended the feast of the Rosary to the whole church.

Today, when dangers far greater than those of the ancient Turks threaten not only Christianity but all; civilization, we are urged by our Blessed Mother to turn again to the Rosary for help.

If men, women and children in sufficient numbers do this, and at the same time carry out the other conditions that she has laid down. We have the greater reason for confidence that we will be delivered from our dangers."

The Twenty-Seventh Week of Ordinary Time

A parable about tenants who were entrusted with their master's fields is at the centre of the Twenty-Seventh **Sunday in Ordinary Time.** We hear Jesus really challenge the religious leaders with this story of the tenant farmers who refused to listen to the master's servants (the prophets) and abused and killed his son (Jesus) in an attempt to usurp his inheritance. Jesus tells them, "Therefore, I say to you, the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people that will produce its fruit."

The Vineyard Church

The parable of the vineyard, in both Isaiah's account and Jesus' reformulation of it for his contemporaries, must in some way be a message given to today's church. Although we believe in Jesus' promise that the armies of hell will not prevail against us, that should not lead us to think that we ourselves cannot squander the gift of the vineyard.

The "always reforming" Church must always ask itself whether it seizes the vineyard inheritance for itself, rather than for the Lord of the harvest. It is only at great peril to themselves that the preacher, the mediator, and the institution, present themselves, rather than the Saviour-Son, as the way of salvation. We put our very stewardship at risk if we follow a gospel other than that of Jesus. ... continued on Page 3
