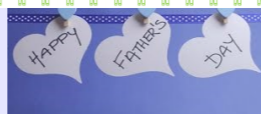


FATHER'S DAY 2021

Lockdown Lemons



It began when the Catholic Women's League members were organising a street stall in June. They provided me with empty jars and I filled them with Jams and Pickles to be sold. Well this year has been exceptionally good for citrus fruit! Our lemon and orange trees have fruited better than they have for some years.

With the abundance of lemons, I froze about 2 litres of juice and started making Lemon Butter. A dozen jars of the Lemon Butter went to the Catholic Women's League Street stall and another dozen to the free food table at the Catholic Care drop in centre in Springwood. We still had plenty of lemons so I made more butter to take to Bathurst to give to some nun friends who live there. The plan was that our three youngest granddaughters and I would deliver them to the sisters in the first week of the school holidays. However the COVID lockdown intervened.

Our next door neighbours also have a lemon tree and placed their excess fruit with a 'FREE' sign on a box at their gate, and a family down the road had a milk crate outside their fence offering 'lockdown lemons', and I'm not one to see good food go to waste so the jars of Lemon Butter in our fridge increased to 48.

Our 'neighbourhood fairy' delivered jars to homes in the street, two medical practices our family attends, six essential workers in our area and to a few people living on their own during the lockdown. At present I am down to 10 jars in my fridge, which hopefully we will be able to take to the friends in Bathurst when this lockdown ends.

A parishioner gave me a tub full of oranges, some of which have been made into marmalade and some given to families. So I am already preparing for the next street stall!

Now I have just one problem! I don't have a single **empty glass jar in the house** and the way things have been for the past few months I wouldn't be surprised if more fruit, to turn into jam, came my way. If anyone can **supply me with small jars I am happy to pick them up from your front yard**, while keeping a safe social distance of course. Just ring Margaret on 4753 1031.

A Message from Mr Paul Ryan, Principal, St Columba's Catholic College:

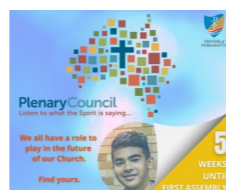

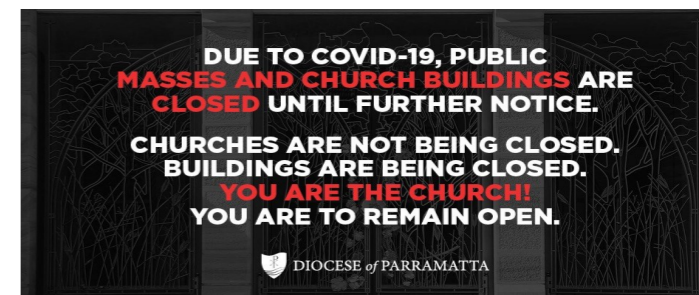

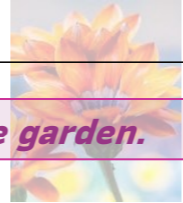

THE SPRINGWOOD MUSTARD SEED



In 2004, some ladies in the Springwood parish were invited to teach children at St Thomas Aquinas Primary School to knit as part of the school's craft programme.

Thus a seed was planted.

It was decided that the students would knit squares which would be sewn into blankets. Well this idea took off with so much enthusiasm that soon grandmas and aunts were joining in to knit and crochet squares, and those who couldn't knit or crochet come together to sew the squares into blankets. These blankets, made with love and care, are donated to the local St. Vincent de Paul conference to be distributed.

The mustard sapling was growing bigger and stronger as new students learn the art of knitting and experienced the joy of doing something personal for those in need.

Each year, at a school assembly, the blankets are presented to a representative of the Vinnies conference and the children told how some of them are gifted to people who often get quite emotional when handed these special rugs.

Families are encouraged to wrap themselves up in the rugs as they watched TV to save on heating costs.

One lady cried and said, "My nanna died when I was little but I remember she had a rug just like this. It is like having my nanna back." An elderly gentleman was delighted to have one in the same colours as his favourite football team.

Newly widowed people are sometimes given a rug with the suggestion that they might wrap themselves in the rug and imagine their loved one is embracing them.

The rugs not only gave warmth but a feeling that there are people, particularly children, who care enough about them to give their time, share their ability to knit or crochet and make something so personal that the rugs have become a symbol of love and caring.

The sapling was growing into a tree; the tap root - the ladies from the parish, and the many small outreaching roots and limbs, the students and staff of St Thomas Aquinas School.

In 2009 students at St Columba's Catholic College, Springwood, some who had been in that first knitting class at St Thomas', responded to the suggestion by one of the staff members that they also knit blankets for Vinnies.

Our mustard tree was growing a strong new branch with more supporting roots and reaching out to ever more people needing special care and love.

Every year Springwood Vinnies are presented with large bundles of brightly coloured, beautifully made blankets which are distributed far and wide. They are gifted to families in need in our local parish area and other parts of the Blue Mountains; families fleeing domestic violence; people affected by fires, floods and droughts; aboriginal families impacted by the stolen generations policy; homeless people, refugees and the newly bereaved.

In 2018 some Sisters of St Joseph, who were convalescing from surgery, formed another beautiful branch of our tree by making quilts. This branch goes back to the very beginning of the St Thomas Aquinas School, as it was the Sisters of St Joseph who opened the school in 1921.

Over the past 18 years more than 600 blankets have been given to Vinnies to distribute.

Our mustard tree has grown into an enormous structure of care and compassion, it has sheltered, nourished and protected so many because of the loving efforts of all those involved.

Our Catholic faith leads us to care, share and love each other. St Mary of the Cross McKillop is attributed as having said, "Never see a need without doing something about it". **The Springwood Mustard Tree is a beautiful example of 'faith in action'.**

Who would have thought that such a seemingly insignificant idea all those years ago would have such an enormous impact on so many?
