SCRIPTURE COMMENTARY by Dianne Bergant CSA

Today's first reading is a very personal message to Ezekiel himself. The prophet is called to keep watch over the entire house of Israel. The enemy that endangers the security of that house is the wickedness that threatens to undermine the nation. Ezekiel acts as sentinel when as a prophet he proclaims God's words of warning. God will hold him responsible if he does not protect the people by proclaiming the word to them. If he is faithful to his charge, he can rest assured that he has fulfilled his responsibility even if the people refuse to heed his message. They will be punished, but he will not be.

The responsorial psalm combines an invitation to praise, a plea for openness, and a divine word. The invitation is given three times: Come, let us sing joyfully (v.1); let us come into his presence (v.2); come, let us bow down (v.6). Three metaphors characterise God's care: the

rock of their salvation (v.1), their creator (v.6), and their shepherd (v.6). Both the psalmist and God plead that the people be open, in contrast to the spirit of rebellion that governed their ancestors in the wilderness (see Ex 17:1-7; Dt 6:16). 'Today' the descendants of those rebellious wanderers are called upon to respond with open faith and willing obedience.

Paul never really repudiates the law. He argues that keeping the law is not required for faith, though faith is required for keeping the law. He tells the Christians of Rome that on the one hand they should owe nothing, while on the other hand they should owe everything, for love requires total self-giving. Paul does not dismiss the importance of fidelity to the commandments. Instead, he maintains that they are fulfilled in the act of loving. Though he only singles out four commandments, Paul insists that love covers all other commandments as well. Love of oneself is the standard that determines the way we treat each other. Following the teaching of Jesus, the love that Paul exhorts should be extended to all without exception.

The gospel describes a three-step process for establishing reconciliation within the community. Any member who remains adamant throughout this process is repudiated. The community should separate itself from them and treat them like those who disdain the gospel. The importance of the community is seen in the fact that it is the community, not merely its leader, that exercises disciplinary power. When Jesus declared that any agreement arrived at by two members of this band will be heard, he was not merely talking about prayer in general, but about prayer for guidance in coming to a decision that will affect community well-being. Here Jesus promises to be present in his church if the members turn to him for guidance.

TWENTY-THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME: YEAR A

Twenty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A – Season of Creation 2 September 10th - Matthew 18:15-20 by Jane Mellett

Matthew chapter 18 is concerned with how the early Christian community might live together in harmony. It reminds us that the church should be a place where the least are considered the greatest and the last first; where we look out for the most vulnerable, where we are accountable to one another and forgive each other. In today's text, Jesus sets out a vision for his followers concerning disputes within the community. The process he lays out is a respectful one and it is also realistic, because some people will not respond to this advice. The teaching reminds us that as a church, we belong to one another, sisters and brothers, one body (1 Cor 12).

As we celebrate this beautiful Season of Creation, this is an appropriate text, for it invites us to reflect on how we are called to live in harmony. The realities of the ecological crises our world faces today highlights the great *disharmony* which exists between humanity and God's creation. We are not living in right relationship with the natural world nor with our sisters and brothers who are suffering the most from the climate and biodiversity crises. We are not living in right relationship with young people who are now growing up *for "we may well be leaving to coming generations, debris, desolation and filth"* (Laudato Si', 161). Pope Francis calls the destruction of nature an "ecological sin". This is not easy to hear, for it makes demands on us. The good news is that there is a cure. Laudato Si' calls us to a profound interior conversion where our relationship with nature is concerned. Today's Gospel reminds us that there are moments when we must speak the truth in love for the greater good. The Season of Creation presents us with such a moment where we can create awareness across our communities so that together we can discern how to care more deeply for God's creation. For this is our common home, the home we all share. We are not alone, Christ is with us on this journey: "For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them".

"The climate crisis is a deeply spiritual crisis...Our faith offers us a wonderful vision to rekindle these relationships, to renew a childlike sense of awe, wonder and beauty and thus set out in living the first commandment God gave to us, to be guardians and protectors of this beautiful world, not its polluters and destroyers." Archbishop Dermot Farrell, Cry of the Earth, Cry of the Poor, (Pastoral Letter).
