It was a first for almost everyone invited to participate in this Synod on 13 to 15 October at Parramatta. The greatest gift of being a part of the Synodal process was offering everyone a safe space to listen and speak. Everyone spoke from their own experience.

The six themes deliberated and voted on during the Synod were drawn from thousands of submissions and comments gathered over the previous three years. They also included themes drawn together in the Plenary in 2022. Each gathering has clarified the initial question, 'What is God asking of us at this time?' as the Church of the future is gestating in our times.

During the Synod, the intentional listening exercises subtly addressed the call from the Garden of Gethsemane, 'that all of them may be one.' Jn 17:21.

Within a rich mix of cultures, everyone took deliberate steps to understand each other as they lived out the core of our unique call into the union/relationship of love.

My question is: Can we begin to imagine how, as a parish, we can embrace the Synodal way of walking closer together?

Gospel Reflection

When trying to understand specific terms in the scriptures I usually refer to an extremely reliable source... dictionary.com. Considering our Gospel is titled 'The Commandments of Love' I searched the definition of love... here are the results:

ST THOMAS AQUIN

Love: Noun

- 1. An intense feeling of deep affection.
- 2. A great interest and pleasure in something.

I'm not sure about you but this doesn't sit well with me. To love does encompass an intense feeling of deep affection, and a great interest and pleasure in something, however it does not completely capture the Christian understanding of love. To understand love we must look to our tradition. The Church since it's conception has employed the Ancient Greek understand of love. There is not a single word for love, there are four; Storge, Eros, Philia & Agape. Storge is a love between parents and children. Eros is a sexual love - a love between husband and wife, and those pursuing the Sacrament of Matrimony. Philia is a love between siblings and friends; a 'brotherly love'. Agape is the highest degree of love; it is charitable, selfless, altruistic, and unconditional. It desires nothing of itself, rather always looks to the other. This final degree is the Christian understanding of love for it is patterned on Christ's love for the Church. As St. John writes in the Gospel 'For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life' (Jn. 3:16). Therefore, love is not confined to an intense feeling of deep affection or a great interest and pleasure in something, but as our Patron St. Thomas Aguinas puts it: 'to love is to the will the highest good of the other as other.'

I chose to outline the Christian understanding of love as it is the theme of our Gospel for this Sunday. The Pharisees, again seeking to trap Jesus, question him on the commandments. They ask 'Master, which is the greatest commandment of the Law?' Jesus, knowing their thoughts, does not single out one law, but brings to the fore the very essence of the Law; 'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment. The second resembles it: You must love your neighbour as yourself.' Love is who God is - He is love incarnate - it is in this vein that we understand why Love of God is the first and greatest commandment; by loving our Lord first we begin to understand what it means to love another person; ultimately it is to draw them towards our loving God. Without this first and essential step the human person can stray from the true meaning of love. Without the example of Our Lord pride begins to creep in and our love becomes selfish. In Our Lord we see what true love looks - to live for the other for their highest good.

As we reflect on our Gospel may we seek to follow the teachings of Our Lord - to love Our Lord with every facet of our being in order to love our neighbour as ourselves.
