## Synod Reflection

Basically, we operated in groups of 7 with tight time structures and we listened intently and reflected on the wisdom and experience of others before the opportunity for sharing with the wider group of 220. We all then voted on the resolutions that will form the foundations of our Diocesan Strategic Plan. Over meals and cups there was a palpable growth in the connection and community across the Diocese so while the Synod was exhausting it was also energising and hope-giving. The agenda was organised into 6 themes (not unlike the Plenary Council) and

the working document is available for your perusal at <a href="www.parracatholic.org">www.parracatholic.org</a>. Obviously, the results of the Synod will be published in due cause but I also invite you to read about it on the Catholic Outlook website.

Both senses of the word catholic come to mind as I refine this brief report. Basically, **catholic** means universal and the synod was an experience of the Catholic nature of our Diocese - the richness of cultures, personalities, ministries, faith expressions ... but all with a love of Jesus and our Church. I conclude with the story submitted by a 92-year-old woman: after decades of generous service in her parish she was lonely and overlooked so how aware are each of us of the needy or marginalised in our community? That is the invitation of Jesus, our Synod and our Pastoral Plan.

## **Divinely Inspired Citizenship**

I must admit I am always impressed at the manner Our Lord carries himself throughout his mission in the Gospels. Being people of faith we know and understand that God took on our humanity for our sake; as St. Paul writes to the Philippians 'though he was in the form of God, he did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied himself, taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. And being found in human form he humbled himself and became obedient unto death, even death on a cross.' Our Lord, moved with love and compassion, came to save humanity from sin and death, a loving act beyond comprehension. Despite this the religious leaders at the time seek his immediate destruction. We read in our Gospel of

a cross.' Our Lord, moved with love and compassion, came to save humanity from sin and death, a loving act beyond comprehension. Despite this the religious leaders at the time seek his immediate destruction. We read in our Gospel of both the Pharisees and Herodians banded together to ensnare Jesus. They have overlooked their differing theologies and ideologies to pursue the destruction of Jesus as they see him as a threat to the status quo. They ask 'Tell us, then, what you think. Is it lawful to pay taxes to Caesar or not?' I can't help but consider Christ's predicament - He's here to save humanity but humanity seems to draw further away from him. What can he do? He could certainly reveal himself then and there as God, bypassing to some extent the glory of the Resurrection - this however wouldn't redeem suffering humanity from their sins, nor would it allow the human person to freely chose God as his/her saviour. Christ, being the source of wisdom, invites the Pharisees and Herodians, and by extension all of human history, to consider what each being is owed in accordance to our love for God; 'Render therefore to Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and to God the things that are God's. His response does not denounce civil law and those who govern, but invites all to uphold the righteous laws of the land and to live as lawful citizens whilst maintaining one's faith.

Dear friends, there are several aspects to bear in mind when reflecting on this Gospel. 1) Christ is so patient with us: often we stray away from Our Lord like the lost sheep; Christ does not berate us nor does he judge us unworthy of the kingdom. On the contrary he invites us back to experience his love. 2) Our love and devotion of God foster's our obedience to civil law: good citizen are those who discern good from evil - as we draw closer to Our Lord our observance of divine law is strengthened which in turn forms a good conscience. This allows us to enact upon the laws of the land in good conscience.

In celebrating the day of the Lord may we ask for the grace of discernment in our lives; to discern good from evil in order to live as lawful citizens of our land. May the Blessed Mother be the model of our supplications; for she was both perfect disciple and perfect citizen.
