

As we are currently in the 2023 – 2024 bushfire season, it is most important to keep you informed about the arrangements for

St Thomas Aquinas Parish should we need to manage a bushfire emergency and how our parishioners receive this information. To ensure the health, safety and welfare of staff and parishioners on days when a Catastrophic Fire Danger Rating is issued in our area, the parish will temporarily close for the day(s) the rating is current. You will be notified by way of our Facebook and Website pages as

soon as possible after the Catastrophic Fire Danger Rating notification is received. Please make sure that you have access to our Facebook and Website pages. A Catastrophic Fire Danger Rating is likely to occur on a very small number of days during the bushfire season, if at all. On the days when the Church is not open during a Catastrophic Fire Danger Rating, there will be no staff on site. The STA parish community will be advised of a return to normal services or alternative arrangements as soon as possible. Up to date bush fire information is available to you on the NSW RFS Fire Danger Rating website and the Hazards Near Me App. If a bushfire threat develops during a church service, the current bushfire plan is one of **Sit and Stay and Shelter (Bushfire**

Robin to Batman: St. John the Baptist

One of my favourite superheroes growing up was the legendary Batman. This character created by artist Bob Kane and writer Bill Finger in 1939 centred around Bruce Wayne, a wealthy American playboy, philanthropist and industrialist who resides in Gotham City. His origin story features him swearing vengeance against criminals after witnessing the murder of his parents Thomas and Martha as a child, a vendetta tempered with the ideal of justice. He trains himself physically and intellectually,



crafts a bat inspired persona, and monitors the Gotham streets at night. Over the course of his career he is accompanied by a variety of supporting characters like Alfred Pennyworth, James Gordon, Bargirl and many more. One of the more iconic supporting characters is the boy-wonder Robin. Donning his trademark green, red and yellow outfit Robin fights crime alongside Batman, eventually transforming into another character known as Nightwing or Red Hood. As Robin grows so does his pride and ego; in some occasions he even finds himself face to face with death at the hands of the Joker. In those moments Robin is quick to recognise his limitations and undergoes a journey of healing and discovery, acknowledging his power but also his inferiority to Batman; a humbling moment for sure.

Now you're probably wondering why this reflection begins with Batman and Robin, well our Gospel for this Sunday centres around the 'biblical Robin': John the Baptist. John is an interesting character as he seems to exhibit all the marks of the foretold Messiah. His birth is foretold in the Old Testament, the Archangel Gabriel announces his miraculous birth, he is of priestly lineage as evident through his father Zechariah administering in the Holy of Holies, and as evident in our Gospel 'All Judaea and all the people of Jerusalem made their way to him, and as they were baptised by him in the river Jordan they confessed their sins.' John isn't just another prophet, it seems he is much more. Unlike Our Blessed Mother John wasn't free from the effects of Original Sin; he was harassed and tempted by the Devil and his fallen angels just like us. With this in mind he would have been tempted to pursue the path of the Messiah as the people continued to flock to him. He could have proclaimed himself as the Messiah... but he didn't. John was aware of his limitations and that he was simply the precursor; a voice crying in the wilderness to prepare the way for the true Messiah. His humility is exemplified when he says: 'Someone is following me, someone who is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to kneel down and undo the strap of his sandals. I have baptised you with water, but he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit.' John lowers himself in order to proclaim the coming Messiah - he decreases so that the Christ may increase.

Dear friends, as we continue our Advent preparation we encounter the beautiful example of John the Baptist: humility. This virtue is key in our pursuit for Christ as the path of the disciples isn't about us proclaiming ourselves, rather, like John the Baptist, we are tasked to proclaim the Christ whose we have encountered. It is Christ who shines in our lives and transforms us and those around whom we experience. May we seek this virtue and so follow the example of the greatest of all men: John the Baptist.
