

Brothers and Sisters: Rejoice Always

Have you ever wondered why the Priest wears different colours during Mass? As a child I liked to guess which of the four colours my parish priest would sport for Mass... little did I know it was all prescribed by the Catholic Church; I just needed to look at Ordo to find the answer. Your everyday Catholic would know the four main liturgical colours: white, red,



violet, and green. According to the General Instruction of the Roman Missal, the purpose of the variety of colour of the sacred vestments is to express outwardly the specific character of the mysteries of faith being celebrated and to give a sense of the passage of the Christian life throughout the course of the liturgical year. In this season of Advent the Church uses violet... but why? Violet is associated with sorrow and repentance of sins; walk through Penrith Westfield or experience end of year celebrations, there's nothing penitent about them. Additionally Advent is generally celebrated with joy as we wait expectantly for the Birth of Christ. Why then does the Church use violet in Advent? Traditionally Advent was treated similarly to Lent - the faithful were asked to increase their prayers and penance in preparation for Our Lord. This is also shown in the readings for the last two Sundays - we look forward to the Second Coming of Christ and use St. John the Baptist's example of humility as means of preparation. Whilst this season does evoke a sense of joy as we look forward to the birth of Christ it still maintains its penitential character.

This Sunday is traditionally called Gaudete Sunday. It's one of the two days in the Church's calendar where the colour rose is used (it's also one of the two days where the Priest looks like a giant easter egg in his rose vestments). Rose is a mixture of Violet and White: it represents the light in the midst of penitence - in short: the penitential season does not last forever. We are called to rejoice today as the Birth of our King is approaching. Our First Reading highlights this as Isaiah foretold that the coming Messiah would usher in a new era of peace: 'The spirit of the Lord has been given to me, for the Lord has anointed me. He has sent me to bring good news to the poor, to bind up hearts that are broken; to proclaim liberty to captives, freedom to those in prison; to proclaim a year of favour from the Lord.' This prophecy ties the Jubilee Year with the Messiah; the chosen one would free all people from their debt of sin - we are no longer bound to sin and death. This reality gives rise to our sense of joy on this Gaudete Sunday.

Dear Friends, with the Birth of Christ only a few days away may we renew our gratitude to Almighty God this Advent. May we zealously continue our preparation with joy as we await the Nativity of Our Lord.

'Well then,' they asked, 'are you Elijah?' 'I am not,' he said. 'Are you the Prophet?' He answered, 'No.' So they said to him, 'Who are you? We must take back an answer to those who sent us. What have you to say about yourself?' So John said, 'I am, as Isaiah prophesied:

a voice that cries in the wilderness: Make a straight way for the Lord.'

Now these men had been sent by the Pharisees, and they put this further question to him, 'Why are you baptising if you are not the Christ, and not Elijah, and not the prophet?' John replied, 'I baptise with water; but there stands among you – unknown to you – the one who is coming after me; and I am not fit to undo his sandal-strap.' This happened at Bethany, on the far side of the Jordan, where John was baptising.
