

Advent Candle 4: Love

Our Gospel for the fourth Sunday of Advent recalls the Visitation of Our Lady to her cousin Elizabeth; its a moving scene where we witness John the Baptist, as early as six months old, exercising his role as the 'voice of one crying out in the wilderness': 'Now as soon as Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the child leapt in her womb and Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit.' Like King David who danced with all his might as the Ark of the Covenant entered Jerusalem so too does John the Baptist with the coming of the Messiah. As incredible as this scene is our reflection for today will not focus on the witness of John the Baptist. Today we explore the person of Mary in the Visitation and how she exemplifies love. With Christmas only a few days away it is necessary to see how she exhibits love as through her we have the perfect example of discipleship.

Consider the events leading up to the Visitation: Mary is greeted by the Archangel Gabriel who announces that she has been called by God to be the Mother of his Son. Despite her engagement to Joseph, and the backlash she would experience in conceiving a child outside wedlock Our Lady accepts God's vocation for her: "I am the handmaid of the Lord,' said Mary 'let what you have said be done to me.'" She trusts the Lord's will for her flourishing and so accepts her vocation with grace and faith. This however isn't the only news: 'Know this too: your kinswoman Elizabeth has, in her old age, herself conceived a son, and she whom people called barren is now in her sixth month, for nothing is impossible to God.' Moved by St. Gabriel's message 'Mary set out and went as quickly as she could to a town in the hill country of Judah.' For readers this may seem like an insignificant detail, however when you consider the geography of Nazareth and Ein Karem (Elizabeth's home) Mary's journey takes on meaning. Ein Karem, one hundred miles from Nazareth, is on the outskirts of Jerusalem and is about 2,474 feet above sea level, while Nazareth is at 1,138 feet. This means Mary had to trek uphill nearly 1,336 feet in elevation. Besides the physical toll it must have taken on the newly pregnant Virgin Mary, the path she took had many hidden dangers. The dirt path that wound through the mountainous region is believed to have been a popular place for bandits, who would surprise unsuspecting travellers. Mary likely wouldn't have travelled alone, scholars agree St. Joseph would have organised a caravan for her or journeyed with her to Elizabeth. Regardless the journey itself would have been taxing, especially for one newly pregnant. Why would Mary readily undertake such a journey? Love. Mary's love for Elizabeth in her time of need moves the former to journey with haste. Our patron St. Thomas defined love as 'to will the good of the other.' Mary exhibits this through her courageous journey to assist Elizabeth.

Dear friends, in celebrating the final Sunday of Advent we light the fourth candle representing love. Love must never be understood as a simple emotion or affection towards another. Love at its finest is divine, its is the very bond that unites the Trinity. Love moves the individual to look beyond oneself to seek the highest good for the other. Mary sought to assist Elizabeth in her time of need. In doing so she also brought love incarnate with her. As we celebrate this final Sunday may we follow the example of Our Lady who in ministering to Elizabeth also brings Our Lord. May all our actions reflect our identity as Christians; those who bring Christ to others.



just as I was commanded in the scroll of the book, 'God, here I am! I am coming to obey your will.'

Notice that he says first: You did not want what the Law lays down as the things to be offered, that is: the sacrifices, the oblations, the holocausts and the sacrifices for sin, and you took no pleasure in them; and then he says: Here I am! I am coming to obey your will. He is abolishing the first sort to replace it with the second. And this will was for us to be made holy by the offering of his body made once and for all by Jesus Christ.
