

Bulletin Reflection – 4th Sunday in Ordinary Time (Year A)

The Beatitudes are among the most challenging and beautiful teachings of Jesus. They turn the world's idea of happiness upside down. Instead of praising wealth, success, or power, Jesus calls blessed those who are humble, merciful, gentle, and hungry for justice.

These words are not abstract ideals; they describe the very heart of Christ. Jesus himself is poor in spirit, meek, merciful, and willing to suffer for the sake of love. In the Beatitudes, he invites us to share his way of living and loving.

This Gospel encourages us to look honestly at our hearts. Where do we seek our security? What do we truly value? The Beatitudes remind us that real joy flows from trusting God, not from controlling outcomes or accumulating possessions.

Living the Beatitudes does not mean avoiding hardship. In fact, Jesus promises blessing even in mourning, persecution, and struggle. When these experiences are united with Christ, they become places of grace.

May the Beatitudes shape our homes, our parish, and our daily choices, so that God's kingdom may be visible among us.

Seeing the crowds, Jesus went up the hill. There he sat down and was joined by his disciples. Then he began to speak. This is what he taught them:


'How happy are the poor in spirit:

During the holiday break, emails will not be regularly monitored. For URGENT or Emergency matters ONLY, please call our after-hours number on 0474 631 168.


All non-urgent enquiries and invoices will be attended to upon our return from leave.

The Presentation of the Lord - 2nd February




Feast originated in Jerusalem before the fifth century and was adopted in Rome during the seventh century. Celebrated forty days after Christmas, commemorating the prescribed Mosaic ritual following the birth of a child, and recalling the encounter of Jesus with Simeon and Anna in the temple. Christ is 'the light to enlighten all nations', and so candles are blessed during the introductory rites and carried in the entrance procession.



One of the most beautiful acts of service in our parish is bringing the presence of Jesus in the Eucharist to those who are sick, elderly, or unable to join us at Mass. This ministry is not only a sacred duty but also a profound gift of comfort, companionship, and faith to those in need. Saint Paul Miki and Companions - 6th February

Died on 5th February 1957, a group of twenty-six martyrs crucified at Nagasaki (Japan). Most were Japanese and most were laypeople, some still youths. The first of many martyrs in a young Church. Paul Miki aged thirty-five years at his death, was a Jesuit scholastic from an aristocratic Japanese family. Remembered as a notable preacher who inspired the local Church in his own time and in the centuries that followed to be strong in faith during persecution and isolation.
